A unique collaboration between Lowitja Institute and Gilead Sciences, empowering Indigenous-designed solutions that advance community health and wellbeing.

The GLOWS Indigenous Health Grant Program is Gilead Sciences' largest investment in Indigenous-led HIV and viral hepatitis initiatives, with \$4.4M AUD over three years to spark innovation, grow Indigenous research leadership and strengthen care pathways nationwide.
